

# Lesson 31: Negatives

## LEARN

- A **negative** is a word that means “no.” The words *not*, *nobody*, *nothing*, *nowhere*, and *never* are negatives. The words *don't*, *won't*, and other contractions made with *not* are also negatives.

You are **not** alone.

**Don't** give up hope!

- Do not use two negatives together in one sentence. To correct a sentence with two negatives, take out one negative or replace it with a word such as *any*, *ever*, *anything*, *anywhere*, or *anyone*.

**INCORRECT** I **don't** want **no** advice.

**CORRECT** I **don't** want advice.

I **don't** want **any** advice.

**INCORRECT** I **don't never** give up hope.

**CORRECT** I **don't** give up hope.

I **don't ever** give up hope.

Barely Passing

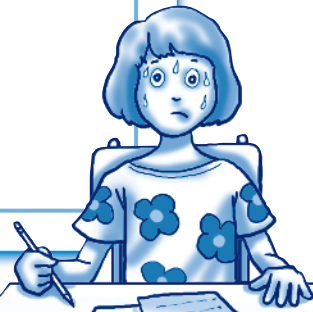
Dear Barely Passing,
