My Plan for Getting Into My First-Choice College

Begin with the end in mind; Start your high school and college planning by asking your teen these questions. Then plan your curriculum around his or her answers.

Q: Parents, what are your thoughts about college? Did you go to college? Do you want your children to go to college? If so, why? If not, why not?

Q: Colleges now expect you to have about 200+ hours of volunteering. Ask your teen, "Where would you enjoy volunteering" Then, be sure to keep track of the hours and get a letter of recommendation from the volunteer supervisor. A:
